Unlike typical fringe fests, Fertile Ground is unadjudicated, and features new work created by local artists, performers & companies. This ensures that the artistic and financial benefits of the Festival stay in Portland. The content of each Festival is shaped by community participation, demonstrating that Portland is fertile ground for creativity, innovation & daring acts of performance. The Festival works toward creating an inclusive, platform including underrepresented voices across race, ethnicity, age, gender, sexuality, background, size, & physical or intellectual ability.

TRUST FALL: WHAT MAKES NEW WORK SPECIAL

I'm writing this in an airport. A play I wrote for Fertile Ground 2019, *The Delays* (directed by now-Festival Director Tamara Carroll!), was set in an airport. It went on to have other productions, but the people who saw it in Fertile Ground back in 2019 were the first to see it.

I'm flying out to a workshop production of my play, *The Storyteller*, which had its first public reading in Fertile Ground 2018. Later this month, that play will have a World Premiere at Artists Repertory Theatre, but the people who saw the reading in Fertile Ground back in 2018 were the first to see it.

I often wonder if those first audiences know what an important role they play in the process of developing new work. Do they know they're not just passive bystanders? Do they know what their presence contributes to the life of a play? Do they know that they're forever woven into the fabric of what they just saw?

For both artist and audience, new work is an act of trust. The artist doesn't know yet if what they've created will translate to an audience— and yeah, sometimes it doesn't. The audience doesn't know yet if an untested work will be their cup of tea— and yeah, sometimes it's not. Nevertheless, the artist closes their eyes, takes a deep breath, and leans back into a trust fall while the audience waits, ready to catch and support them.

So what's the best way to make sure the audience does catch that ever-trusting artist? I've spent a lot of time on both sides of the new work equation, and while the answer can differ for every artist and every work of art, there's a mindset I find works best when approaching new work. Here's what I try to do:

Explore. Critic Elinor Fuchs famously encouraged people to think of every play as a small planet with its own set of rules. Encounter new work with curiosity and an open mind. You get to traverse a world no one's seen before!

Respond. Not everyone is going to want feedback, but when they do- or when you're discussing what you saw with a friend over drinks- don't let what you think something should be cloud what it is. Ask questions. What did you find meaningful? What did you wonder about? What was the artist trying to say?

Enjoy. It's exciting to encounter something in its newest form. You will forever be the first people to witness this new work, and that's pretty special.

With new work, the partnership between artist and audience goes beyond entertainment. It's a fall, it's a catch, and you're the first to experience all of it.

Sara Jean Accuardi is an award-winning playwright, and recipient of the Oregon Book Award for Drama; The James F. and Marion L. Miller Spark Award for Oregon artists; the Drammy Award for Outstanding Original Script; the Leslie Bradshaw Fellowship for Drama; and was the winner of the Inaugural International Thomas Wolfe Playwriting Competition. Sara Jean is a proud member of the Dramatist Guild and LineStorm Playwrights. She holds an MFA in Writing for the Screen and Stage from Northwestern University.

TICKETS & PASSES



Single tickets are available for every show in the 2025 Fertiel Ground Festival, in addition to several Festival Pass options. New to the Festival this year, we are offering a 6-Punch, a 10-Punch, or an Unlimited Pass. 6- and 10-Punch Passes may be used for up to 2 tickets per performance, while the Unlimited Pass may only be used to reserve a single ticket per performance. A small number of projects are not eligible for Pass use - visit the Ticketing page on the Fertile Ground website (fertilegroundpdx.org) for more details.

Booking Tickets Online

Advance booking is highly recommended! Tickets for all shows can found online at fertileground.tix.page. Check each show page for details & special ticket offerings, and find additional show-specific information in your ticket confirmation emails.

Booking Tickets at the Door

Available tickets may be purchased day-of at the door using a credit card, tap-to-pay, or a Festival Pass. The majority of venues cannot accept cash at the door - please prepare accordingly.

We're Paperless!

The name on your ticket reservation is all you'll need to check in at each venue. If you booked a student, senior, or Arts for All ticket, please bring appropriate identification!

Where does the money go?

Festival Producers receive all profits from their single ticket sales, minus a small pergentage for administrative costs.

When you book single tickets using a Festival Pass, Producers are reimbursed for 50% of each ticket cost. This is our first year reimbursing artists for tickets booked with a Pass, and our goal is to eventually be able to reimburse artists for the *full* cost of the ticket, keeping more money in the hands of both artists AND audiences.

THE 2025 GROW PROGRAM

First introduced in 2020, the GROW Program seeks to reduce financial barriers to Festival participation, and serve as a small act of redress for the history of harm, exclusion, and exploitation the American theatre perpetuates against many identities. Adjudicated by a diverse, independent panel of local artists, applicants are selected for their project's focus on underrepresented stories, innovative storytelling, and the potential for individual artistic growth. This year, in addition to the traditional \$500 for project expenses, grantees receive priority placement in a Festival venue, and professional project photos for their portfolio.

We feel honored these artists have chosen to share their work as part of Fertile Ground.

Every Pretty Thing by Ken Yoshikawa & Alanna Fagan

Developed through Roots and All Theatre Ensemble, Alanna Fagan and Ken Yoshikawa wanted to examine the impact social

media and pop psychology have on modern connection. Part social experiment, part avant garde performance art, this guerrilla theatre experiment will be unlike any other audience experience. After this Fertile Ground workshop Every Pretty Thing will continue its evolution in the fall of 2025 as the MainStage production of Roots and All Theatre Ensemble, in collaboration with Coho Productions.

Harvest of Woman by Olga Kravstova

Harvest of Woman comes from a deep need to give voice to the unseen labor, endurance, and quiet power of women. It began as an exploration of caregiving and

sacrifice, but is evolving into something more—an experiment in what happens when women are allowed to exist fully, as both light and shadow, nurturers and destroyers.

My hope is that Harvest of Woman will not just be a performance but an experience—one that lingers, unsettles, and reshapes how we see the labor, sacrifice, and survival of women.


Exemplar by Jody Read

Exemplar began as a gender-swapped Mad Men, which placed men in the same vulnerable positions women have so often found themselves in

both in and out of the workspace. However, as the play developed alongside the harmful rhetoric against those outside the gender binary, I wanted to emphasize that as long as there is a binary someone is going to end up on the bottom of the food chain. As efforts persist to write nonbinary individuals out of existence, Exemplar asks "what purpose has the binary served throughout history, and what service is it to us now?"

Predator Pray by Pearson Kunz

This is the first staged premiere, which I hope will lead to future publication and productions nationwide. This play is a deeply personal exploration of faith,



queemess, and violence, that should challenge audiences. Fertile Ground provides the perfect launchpad to develop, refine, and receive feedback on this work while supporting my growth as a playwright and expanding my reach in queer storytelling. My dream is to continue creating bold, thought-provoking theatre that challenges expectations and amplifies queer voices on stages across the country.

Hanuman's Shadow: Echoes

of Laos & America by Samson Syharath

I'm sharing my personal journey as a Laotian American, reflecting on themes of cultural preservation, displacement, and identity. The piece invites audiences to consider

how history and myth can shape our lives and gives voice to the collective traumas and triumphs of Southeast Asian immigrant communities.

By blending these cultural touchstones with the historical impacts of U.S. involvement in Laos, the show amplifies the experiences of Laotian immigrants and refugees—communities that have often been overlooked and whose stories remain largely untold.

right, you will be successful. As a Latino male I'm constantly asking myself, "what does doing 'everything right' mean?" and "right for who?" I value growth as an artist - to me that means being as vulnerable as I can in my work. I'm pulling back the curtain on what Latino and BIPOC or underrepresented artists struggle with, and especially how it affects their life offstage.

HELP US CONTINUE GROWING

The funding landscape changed a lot this year, and we are only at the beginning. Fewer funders offer opportunities for individual artists, and the creative community recently received the devastating news that the National Endowment for the Arts cancelled one of their largest grant programs, due to its focus on arts access for underserved communities.

These changes cannot stop us from driving new work forward, especially the work of artists whose stories we have a responsibility to platform, and whose artistic growth and continued work enrich our community.



CONCILIATION By David Fuks

At a therapy session in Germany, descendants of Nazi perpetrators and descendants of Holocaust victims meet to act out their fraught histories and seek a path towards understanding. Conciliation focuses on the possibility of making amends and can be viewed as a Holocaust education tool.
